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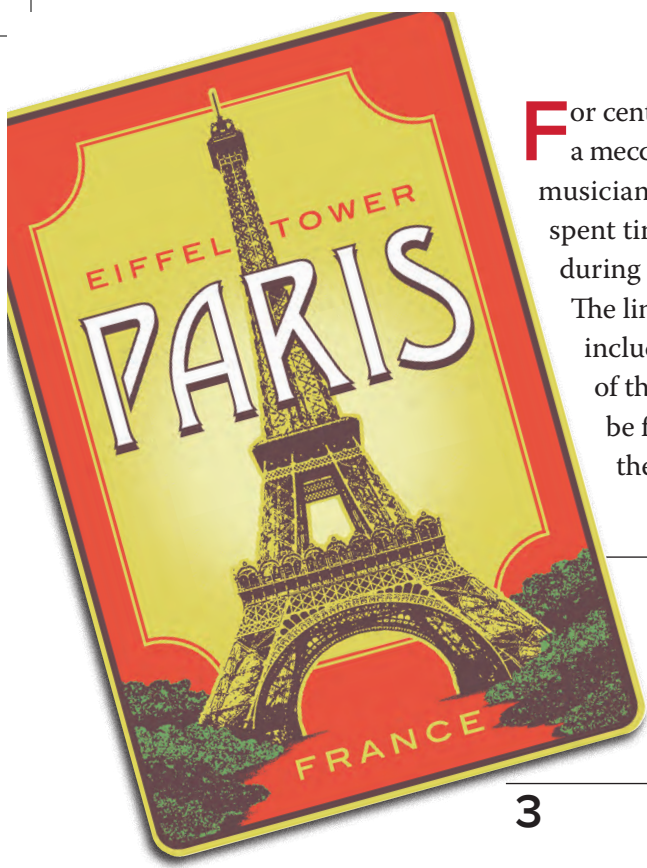
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For centuries, the city of Paris has been a mecca for artists. Writers, painters and musicians from all over the world have spent time here, perhaps most notably during the first half of the 20th century. The lingering presence of these giants, including the American expatriates of the so-called Lost Generation, can be felt in the cafes and bars where they wine, dined and worked.

Gertrude Stein's home at 27 rue de Fleurus was a gathering spot for the likes of Hemingway, Fitzgerald and Picasso.

The popularity of Victor Hugo's 1831 novel *The Hunchback of Notre-Dame* effectively shamed the City of Paris into restoring the neglected *Notre-Dame Cathedral*.



Left Bank cafe *Les Deux Magots* was a favorite hangout of the city's literary and intellectual elite, including surrealist artists and existentialist philosophers.

In 1928, Ernest Hemingway stashed two trunks of notebooks in the *Ritz Hotel* basement. They remained there until 1956, when he retrieved

them and used them as the basis for *A Moveable Feast*, a memoir of his Paris years.

American expatriate writers met and sometimes crashed at *Shakespeare & Company*, a bookstore owned by Sylvia Beach, who also published James Joyce's *Ulysses* when no other publisher would.

Freedom of expression has always been celebrated in the City by the Bay. Even before the midcentury flowering of the Beat Generation, the counterculture movement and Haight-Ashbury, the area was known for attracting literary non-conformists like Mark Twain. Residents like Amy Tan and Michael Chabon keep San Francisco's creative spirit alive today.

Vesuvio Cafe opened in 1948 and was frequented by Beat Generation writers like Kerouac, Ginsberg and Ferlinghetti. Dylan Thomas, Bob Dylan and Francis Ford Coppola hung out here, too.

Private detective Sam Spade dines at John's Grill in Dashiell Hammett's *The Maltese Falcon*. The historic eatery was also named one of the top 10 restaurants in the United States by *Esquire* magazine.



The University of California at Berkeley's *Sprout Plaza* was the site of student protests in the 1960s and became the epicenter of the Free Speech Movement.

Writer Gertrude Stein coined the phrase "There is no there there" in reference to Oakland. In response and tribute, a sculpture called "There" was installed in the city in 1988.

Oakland bar *Heinold's First and Last Chance*, open since 1883, is known as "Jack London's Rendezvous." London's writings were influenced by sailors and others he met there.

With its bevy of fountains, sculptures and architectural ruins, Rome may be best known for visual splendor. But it also has a rich literary pedigree dating to its ancient past, when thinkers with one name like Ovid and Cicero wrote epic poems and invented satire. In later centuries, expatriate writers fell under the city's charms. All roads—and lots of books, music and movies—lead to Rome.

Literary legends including Goethe, John Keats, Stendhal, Lord Byron and Charles Dickens have been served at **Antico Caffè Greco**, one of the oldest cafes in Italy.

Keats, his friend Percy Shelley and many other expatriate writers and artists are interred at Rome's **Protestant Cemetery**.

The house in Rome where Keats spent his last months has been preserved as **Keats-Shelley House**, a museum dedicated to him and other English Romantic poets who were spellbound by the city.

So many American movies were shot at Rome's **Cinecittà** film studios in the 1950s

and 60s that the city was nicknamed Hollywood on the Tiber.

The area surrounding **Piazza di Spagna** became known as the English Quarter in the 1800s due to its large population of expatriate artists.

It's best known as the Windy City, but in 1920 it was called the literary capital of the U.S. by H.L. Mencken. That was the era of the Chicago Renaissance, when local writers, buoyed by daring homegrown literary journals, were creating work that stood apart from the influence of New York and Europe. Later decades saw a wave of activity from African

American writers. The City of the Big Shoulders is also famous for the blues and early jazz, and was the setting for seemingly every teen movie in the 1980s.

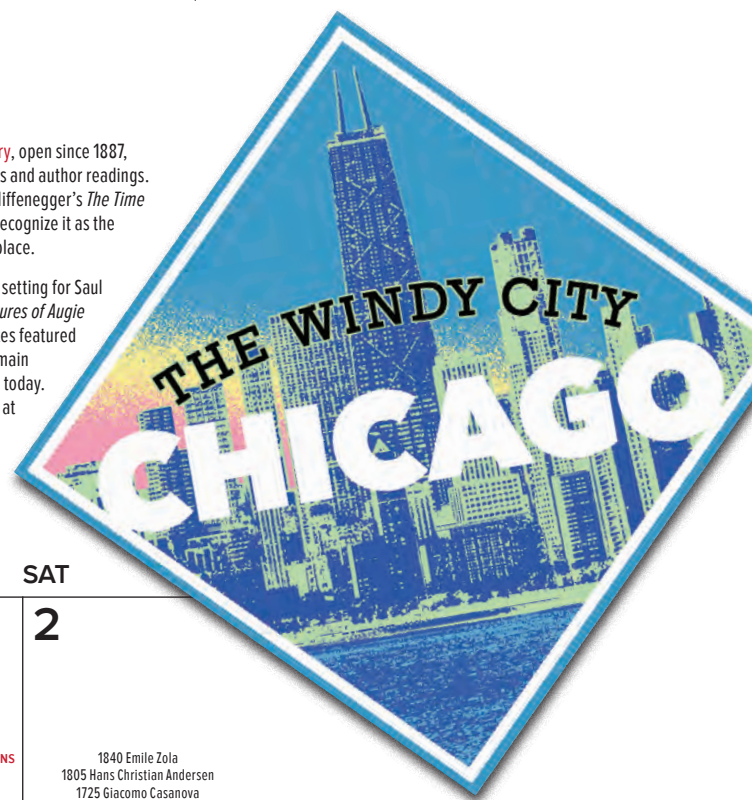


Ferris Bueller's Day Off was the first film allowed to shoot inside **The Art Institute of Chicago**. The museum was a favorite haunt of director John Hughes during his youth.

In suburban Oak Park, Hemingway fans can visit the home where the author was born, as well as the **Ernest Hemingway Museum**.

The **Newberry Library**, open since 1887, offers exhibits, tours and author readings. Readers of Audrey Niffenegger's *The Time Traveler's Wife* will recognize it as the protagonist's workplace.

Humbolt Park is the setting for Saul Bellow's *The Adventures of Augie March*, and many sites featured in the 1953 book remain virtually unchanged today. Bellow lived nearby at 2629 West Augusta Boulevard.

In Japan's dizzying capital, skyscrapers rub shoulders with Buddhist temples, and high art mingles with low. These dichotomies fuel Tokyo's literary scene, which benefited in recent centuries from increased exposure to Western ideas and forms. Haruki Murakami is Japan's best known modern writer; his surreal novels have been translated into 50 languages. Japan's quirky pop culture, including karaoke, manga and anime, is on vivid display in Tokyo—and increasingly around the world.

*Rokuji*gen is a book cafe on Tokyo's west side that serves as a hub for information about writer Haruki Murakami and is a gathering place for his fans. The cafe's name means "six dimensions" in Japanese, and the only sign visible from the street is a small painted numeral 6.

Two Japanese writers have won the Nobel Prize for Literature: Yasunari Kawabata in 1968 and Kenzaburō Ōe in 1994.

Book Clock is a video installation by designer Masaaki Hiramura in which a hand flips through three books

representing hours, minutes and seconds. It can be seen at the MUJI department store in Shibuya.

Anime fans can visit *The Ghibli Museum* operated by Studio Ghibli, makers of *Spirited Away* and other internationally-distributed films.

Nothing's better on a rainy day than hanging out in a coffee shop reading, and Seattle has plenty of rain and coffee shops. Maybe that's why it's always near the top in rankings of America's most literate cities. Lots of writers live in the area, from Tom Robbins to Erik Larsen and Maria Semple. Seattle's music history includes Jimi

Hendrix, who was born here, and Quincy Jones, who spent his teen years here, but it is best known for 90s alternative bands like Nirvana.

The *Blue Moon* is a legendary watering hole favored by Seattle writers like the poet Theodore Roethke, who celebrated winning the Pulitzer Prize there in 1953. The adjacent alley was named Roethke Mews in honor of Roethke, who taught nearby at the University of Washington.



Seattle-based record label *Sub Pop*, founded in 1988, helped popularize grunge music by being the first to sign area bands like Nirvana, Soundgarden and Mudhoney.

In the early 1950s, *Quincy Jones* and *Clint Eastwood* were both music students at Seattle University.

Seattle's *EMP Museum*, formerly known as the Experience Music Project, is a nonprofit museum devoted to popular culture, and is also home to the *Science Fiction and Fantasy Hall of Fame*.

Known for its cultural institutions and trendsetting old-meets-new atmosphere, Berlin has been a destination for writers and other artists for hundreds of years. The list of creative types with a “Berlin era” in their biography includes writers Franz Kafka and Vladimir Nabokov as well as rock musician David Bowie, who famously described 1970s-era Berlin as “the greatest cultural extravaganza that one could imagine.”

The **Bebelplatz** is a public square where 20,000 books were burned by Nazi officials in May 1933. A memorial, installed in 1995, consists of a glass plate at ground level which provides a view into a subterranean room lined with empty bookcases.



A sign inside the Speisekammer BIO Supermarket on Motzstrasse marks the approximate former location of the **Eldorado**, a nightclub featured in Christopher Isherwood's *Goodbye to Berlin*, the novel that inspired the musical and film *Cabaret*.

Babelsberg Film Studio is the world's oldest large studio complex. Open since 1912, it predates Hollywood and has been host to hundreds of productions, from Fritz Lang's *Metropolis* to *The Hunger Games*.

Spectacular beaches and mountain peaks aren't the only reasons this tropical metropolis is called Cidade Maravilhosa (The Marvelous City). Rio is Brazil's vibrant cultural center, known for Carnival and bossa nova, the fusion of samba and jazz that swept the world in the 60s. There's a long moviemaking tradition and an evolving body of literature reflective of Brazil's multicultural makeup.

“*The Girl From Ipanema*,” as performed by João Gilberto and Stan Getz (and sung by Gilberto's wife Astrud), won the Grammy for Record of the Year in 1965. The lyrics were inspired by an actual young woman the songwriters observed in Ipanema, an upscale seaside neighborhood in Rio.

Machado de Assis, born in Rio in 1839, is largely considered the greatest writer of Brazilian literature. His works have been championed by Salman Rushdie, Woody Allen, Harold Bloom and others.

Rio's iconic **Cristo Redentor** statue is situated at the peak of the **Corcovado** mountain. “Corcovado” is also the name of a popular bossa nova song written by Antônio Carlos Jobim. Incidentally, jazz musician Duke Pearson was so inspired by the statue while on tour in Brazil that he wrote a tune named “Cristo Redentor.”

Rio's **Biblioteca Nacional do Brasil** is the largest library in Latin America and one of the largest libraries in the world.

No longer just a hub for safari tourism, Kenya's capital city boasts a vibrant cultural scene encompassing music, film, art and literature. While many of the best-known books set here were written by Europeans during times of British colonization, Kenya has a long storytelling tradition of its own. Today, important Kenyan authors are increasingly making their voices heard around the globe.



Karen Blixen, who wrote *Out of Africa* under the pen name Isak Dinesen, was a Danish author who lived near Nairobi and operated a coffee plantation there from 1913 to 1931. Her former home now houses the **Karen Blixen Museum**.

Out of Africa was selected by the Modern Library as one of the 100 best nonfiction books of all time.

Ngũgĩ wa Thiong'o's *Weep Not, Child* (1964) was the first novel by an East African to be published in English. His *In the House of the Interpreter* was a 2012 National Book Critics Circle Award Finalist.

Kenyan author **Kenneth Binyavanga Wainaina**, born in 1971, was listed in the 2014 "Time 100," *Time* magazine's list of the world's most influential people.

With over 2,000 years of glorious history under its belt, London's influence on the English language, world literature and Western culture in general is impossible to overstate. From Chaucer, Shakespeare and Dickens to Lennon, McCartney and Jagger, enough legends have lived and worked here to fill a few dozen double-decker sightseeing buses.

The *Pillars of Hercules* pub dates to the 1730s and has been frequented by Martin Amis, Ian McEwan and Charles Dickens, who mentions it in *A Tale of Two Cities*.

The *Charles Dickens Museum* is located in the house where the novelist and social critic lived from 1837 to 1839.



Shakespeare's Globe, a faithful reconstruction of the Elizabethan-era Globe theatre, includes exhibits dedicated to the Bard and his era.

Potterheads will enjoy a photo op and souvenir-hunting at the *Harry Potter Shop at Platform 9 3/4*, located in the western departures concourse of King's Cross Station.

When *Aldous Huxley* taught French at the prestigious boarding school Eton College, one of his pupils was a young *George Orwell*.

The iconic cover photograph for The Beatles' *Abbey Road* was shot in a "zebra crossing" near the *Abbey Road Studios*. Today the crosswalk is a must-see (and must-walk) for Fab Four fans.

St. Petersburg is known as the cultural capital of Russia. With a heady mix of striking beauty and turbulent politics, the city looms large in the lives and works of the country's greatest writers, including Dostoyevsky, Tolstoy and Nabokov. Russia's first music conservatories were founded here, and The Mariinsky Theatre and Hermitage Museum are both internationally renowned.



Composers Modest Mussorgsky, Pyotr Ilyich Tchaikovsky and writer Fyodor Dostoyevsky are among the famous Russians entombed in the cemeteries of the Saint Alexander Nevsky Monastery in St. Petersburg.

Sennaya Square and the neighborhood surrounding it are the setting for Dostoyevsky's 1866 novel *Crime and Punishment* as well as *The Nose*, a short story by Nikolai Gogol published in 1836.

The F.M. Dostoyevsky Literary Memorial Museum, which opened in 1971, is located in the apartment where the writer lived when he wrote some of his most famous works, including *The Brothers Karamazov*.

The author Tom Wolfe said of New York City, "Culture just seems to be in the air, like part of the weather." Indeed, the list of literary and artistic movements that were born here is longer than the Empire State Building is tall—the Harlem Renaissance, comic books, modern dance, bebop, abstract expressionism, hip hop, disco, Tin Pan Alley and punk, just to name a few.

The gated tree-lined lane known as Patchin Place has been home to famous writers like E.E. Cummings, Ezra Pound and O. Henry.

Fans of *The Catcher in the Rye* can follow in Holden Caulfield's footsteps



at locations like the Museum of Natural History, Grand Central Oyster Bar, Radio City Music Hall and the Central Park Zoo Carousel.

Hip hop traces its roots to 1520 Sedgwick Avenue in the Bronx, where the innovative Jamaican-born DJ Kool Herc spun records for parties in the early 1970s.

The Algonquin Hotel's Round Table Room was the famed gathering spot of Dorothy Parker and other literary wits, who met almost daily there for the better part of ten years.
