Gertrude Stein's home at 27 rue de Fleurus was a gathering spot for the likes of Hemingway, Fitzgerald and Picasso.

The popularity of Victor Hugo's 1831 novel The Hunchback of Notre-Dame effectively shamed the City of Paris into restoring the neglected Notre-Dame Cathedral

Left Bank cafe Les Deux Magots was a favorite hangout of the city's literary and intellectual elite, including surrealist artists and existentialist philosophers.

In 1928, Ernest Hemingway stashed two trunks of notebooks in the Ritz Hotel basement. They

remained there until 1956, when he retrieved

them and used them as the basis for A Moveable Feast, a memoir of his Paris years.

American expatriate writers met and sometimes crashed at Shakespeare & Company, a bookstore owned by Sylvia Beach, who also published James Joyce's Ulysses when no other publisher would.

ith its bevy of fountains, sculptures and architectural ruins, Rome may be best known for visual splendor. But it also has a rich literary pedigree dating to its ancient past, when thinkers with one name like Ovid and Cicero wrote epic poems and invented satire. In later centuries, expatriate writers fell under the city's charms. All roads-and lots of books, music and movies—lead to Rome.

Literary legends including Goethe, John Keats, Stendhal, Lord Byron and Charles Dickens have been served at Antico Caffè Greco, one of the oldest cafes in Italy.

The house in Rome where Keats spent his last months has been preserved as Keats-Shelley House, a museum dedicated to him and other English Romantic poets who were spellbound by the city

The area surrounding Piazza di Spagna became known as the English Quarter in the 1800s due to its large population of expatriate artists.

American writers. The City of the Big Shoulders is also famous for the blues and early jazz, and was the setting for seemingly every teen movie in the 1980s.



Ferris Bueller's Day Off was the first film allowed to shoot inside The Art Institute of Chicago. The museum was a favorite haunt of director John Hughes during his youth.

In suburban Oak Park, Hemingway fans can visit the home where the author was born, as well as the Ernest Hemingway Museum

The Newberry Library, open since 1887, offers exhibits, tours and author readings. Readers of Audrey Niffenegger's The Time Traveler's Wife will recognize it as the protagonist's workplace.

Humbolt Park is the setting for Saul Bellow's The Adventures of Augie March, and many sites featured in the 1953 book remain virtually unchanged today. Bellow lived nearby at 2629 West Augusta Boulevard.

n Japan's dizzying capital, skyscrapers rub shoulders with Buddhist temples, and high art mingles with low. These dichotomies fuel Tokyo's literary scene, which benefited in recent centuries from increased exposure to Western ideas and forms. Haruki Murakami is Japan's best known modern writer; his surreal novels have been translated into 50 languages. Japan's quirky pop culture, including karaoke, manga and anime, is on vivid display in Tokyo-and increasingly around the world.

Rokujigen is a book cafe on Tokyo's west side that serves as a hub for information about writer Haruki Murakami and is a gathering place for his fans. The cafe's name means "six dimensions" in Japanese, and the only sign visible from the street is a small painted numeral 6.

The **Bebelplatz** is a public square where 20,000 books were burned by Nazi officials in May 1933. A memorial. installed in 1995, consists of a glass plate at ground level which provides a view into a subterranean room lined with empty bookcases.

A sign inside the Speisekammer BIO Supermarket on Motzstrasse marks the approximate former location of the Eldorado, a nightclub featured in Christopher Isherwood's Goodbye to Berlin, the novel that inspired the musical and film Cabaret.

Babelsberg Film Studio is the world's oldest large studio complex. Open since 1912, it predates Hollywood and has been host to hundreds of productions. from Fritz Lang's Metropolis to The Hunaer Games.

"The Girl From Ipanema," as performed by João Gilberto and Stan Getz (and sung by Gilberto's wife Astrud), won the Grammy for Record of the Year in 1965. The lyrics were inspired by an actual young woman the songwriters observed in Ipanema, an upscale seaside neighborhood in Rio.






